Professional Development (Most Recent Three Years)

Teachers meet frequently within Professional Learning Communities for lesson study and grade specific institutes to plan and discuss what they are doing and how to coordinate instruction. A teacher survey is taken at the end of the school year that guides site professional development and in-service selection decisions. Student data is also used to determine professional development offerings. Sites design specific professional development based on California Statet standards, the California Standards for the Teaching Profession, and research-based practices.

Educational Services, Special Education, English Learners, Student Assessment and Accountability, and Teacher Support departments participate in the planning and implementation of District staff development activities. Over the past three years we have had support in academic instruction, non violent crisis intervention training, Capturing Kids Hearts training, and benchmark/CAASPP training and implementation.

Wednesday morning students arrive at a later time to allow for articulation and intensive training purposes specific to the instruction of the student population at Yellen Learning Center. This time is also used for didactic and hands on training by a consultant contracted with the district to work with the staff.

Conference and convention attendance, in-service meetings and staff collaboration offers additional opportunities for professional growth. Teachers observe other professionals, engage in peer coaching and work with mentors and grade level or departmental colleagues.
