Bridgeport Elementary School is located in the central region of Bridgeport and serves students in grades TK through eight following a traditional calendar. At the beginning of the 2017-18 school year, 64 students were enrolled, including 17% in special education, 9% qualifying for English Language Learner support, and 48% qualifying for free or reduced price lunch.

All textbooks used in the core curriculum at Bridgeport Elementary School are aligned to the California Content Standards and Frameworks. Instructional materials are selected from the state's most recent list of standards-based materials and adopted by the State Board of Education. The district follows the State Board of Education's six-year adoption cycle for core content materials (English/language arts,

On Tuesday, October 18, 2011, the Eastern Sierra Unified School District's Board of Trustees held a public hearing to certify the extent to which textbooks and instructional materials have been provided to students. The Board of Trustees adopted Resolution #11-11 which certifies as required by Education Code §60119 (1) that textbooks and instructional materials were provided to all students, including English learners, in the district to the extent that each pupil has a textbook or instructional materials, or both, to use in class and to take home, and (2) sufficient textbooks and instructional materials were provided to each student, including English learners, that are aligned to the academic content standards and consistent with the cycles and content of the curriculum frameworks in math, science, history-social science, and English/language arts. math, science, and social science).

In addition to core subject areas, districts are required to disclose in their SARCs the sufficiency of instructional materials used for their visual/performing arts curricula. During the 2011-12 school year, Eastern Sierra Unified School District provided each student, including English learners, enrolled in a visual/performing arts class with a textbook or instructional materials to use in class and to take home. These materials complied with the state's content standards and curriculum frameworks.

## School Facility Conditions and Planned Improvements (Most Recent Year)

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The district takes great efforts to ensure that all schools are clean, safe, and functional through proper facilities maintenance and campus supervision. Bridgeport Elementary School's original facilities were built in 1963; ongoing maintenance and campus improvements ensure facilities remain up to date and provide adequate space for students and staff. District maintenance and site custodial staff ensure that the repairs necessary to keep the school in good condition are completed in a timely manner. A work order process is used by school and district staff to communicate non and routine maintenance requests.

Every morning before school begins, the custodian inspects facilities for safety hazards or other conditions that need attention prior to students and staff entering school grounds. One day custodian and one evening custodian are assigned to Bridgeport Elementary School. The day custodian is responsible for:

- Classroom cleaning
- Grounds keeping
- Restroom cleaning
- Bus transportation
- Minor maintenance

Restrooms are checked regularly throughout the day for cleanliness and are cleaned daily. The evening custodian is responsible for:

- Classroom cleaning
- Common use area cleaning
- Restroom cleaning
- Minor maintenance

The principal and Director of Maintenance communicates with custodial staff daily concerning maintenance and school safety issues. A new maintenance work order call in procedure and log were created in 2014 to better communicate ongoing maintenance issues and problems.

### Deferred Maintenance

Bridgeport Elementary School participates in the State School Deferred Maintenance Program, which provides dollar-for-dollar matching funds to assist school districts with major repairs or replacement of existing school building components. Deferred maintenance projects generally include roofing, plumbing, heating, air conditioning, electrical systems, interior/exterior painting, and floor systems. Bridgeport Elementary School did not qualify to receive deferred maintenance funds for campus repairs and/or improvements.

### Facilities Inspection

The district's maintenance department inspects Bridgeport Elementary School on an annual basis in accordance with Education Code §17592.72(c)(1). Bridgeport Elementary School uses a school site inspection survey to identify unsafe or hazardous conditions and facility improvement needs. The most recent school inspection took place on November 5, 2017. No emergency repairs were needed and no unsafe conditions were found. During fiscal year 2017-18, all restrooms were fully functional and available for student use.

### Campus Supervision

School administration and teaching staff place a high priority on providing adequate adult supervision on campus before, during, and after school. As students arrive on campus each morning, the principal and teachers are strategically assigned to designated entrance areas and the playground. The principal, classified staff, and lunch duty aides monitor lunch time activity in the cafeteria and on the playground. At the end of the day when students are dismissed, the principal and teachers monitor student behavior to ensure a safe and orderly departure. Bridgeport Elementary School is a closed campus. During school hours, all visitors must sign in at the school's office and wear identification badges while on school grounds.

## Professional Development (Most Recent Three Years)

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Bridgeport Elementary School along with the rest of our district have focused our professional development on being prepared to implement the new Common Core State Standards next school year. We will have 3 in-service days this school year that will focus on implementing the Common Core. One of our early release Friday's each month is also dedicated to the implementation of the Common Core. Additionally, we are receiving support from MCOE in our grade level meetings to help us implement the Common Core.

Bridgeport Elementary School provides professional, highly qualified staff that provide additional services and support centered on the whole student academically, physically, and mentally. The Counseling and Support Services table in this report illustrates the availability of non-instructional support staff to Bridgeport Elementary School's students. Full-time equivalent (FTE) is a standard measurement used to identify an employee's regular work load on a weekly basis. For example, an FTE of 1.0 designates a full-time position and the employee is on campus and available all day every day of the week; an FTE of 0.5 indicates that the staff member is available and on campus a portion (50%) of the week.

### Teacher Assignment

During the 20156-17 school year, Bridgeport Elementary School had 5 teachers who met all credential requirements in accordance with state guidelines. The Federal No Child Left Behind Act requires that all teachers in core subject areas meet certain requirements in order to be considered as "NCLB Compliant." Minimum qualifications include: possession of a bachelor's degree, possession of an appropriate California teaching credential, and demonstrated competence in core academic subjects. In the table below, which identifies the number of classrooms taught by NCLB-compliant and non-compliant teachers, high poverty schools are those schools in the highest quartile for student participation defined by the free and reduced price meal program. Low poverty schools are those schools that are in the lowest quartile of program participation.
